## JAMES CROWE RICHMOND

### **BIOGRAPHICAL NOTE**

JAMES CROWE RICHMOND was born in London in 1822. His father, one of the lawyers who helped draft the first Reform Bill of 1832, died at the age of 46, leaving a widow and four children.

The Richmonds were Unitarians, so James went to the Unitarian School at Hove House, Brighton, under Dr Hutton, then to University College, London. He trained as a civil engineer in the firm of Samuda, where he made the acquaintance of a fellow student, John Atkinson, beginning an important family relationship. After qualifying Richmond was employed for some time under Sir Isambard Brunel, then engineer to the Great Western Railway.

The health of an elder brother, Christopher, made it desirable that the family should leave England. James and Henry sailed in the *Victory* and on 1st February, 1851, landed in Auckland, leaving a few days later on foot for Taranaki by way of the Waikato and Kawhia.

Probably influenced by the beauty of Mt Egmont rising out from a sea of untouched bush, James and Henry bought four sections five miles inland from New Plymouth; and advised the Richmonds and the Atkinsons, now united by friendship and several marriages, to follow them to New Zealand.

Their first section, a small one, had been partly cultivated by a former holder. James and Henry added to it and when the rest of the family arrived in 1853, they increased their total area to 1,000 acres.

In 1852 Richmond contested the Taranaki seat in the Legislative Council of New Ulster. In 1853, when the Richmond family was settled, he returned to Europe, where he married Mary Smith, a first cousin of the Atkinsons. In Belgium he worked with an English company on railway construction; then painted in the Isle of Arran before he and his wife returned to New Zealand. For some time Richmond had shown a considerable talent for painting. He had almost no formal training, but from studying the work of his contemporaries and other painters whom he admired (Turner, Girtin, Prout, Cotman), and with his keen observation and feeling for landscape, he had developed a very proficient watercolour style.

Not long after the Richmonds' return to New Zealand, native affairs assumed an unfavourable aspect. The Rawiri-Katatore feud had plunged the Maori into a desultory tribal war. When the Taranaki Volunteer Rifle Company was formed in 1858 Richmond joined as a private. In November of that same year he was elected to the Provincial Council for the Grey and Bell constituency; shortly afterwards being appointed to the Executive. Richmond's disposition towards the Maori was very friendly, as can be seen from his contributions to

the Taranaki Herald. When in 1860 the Governor (Gore-Brown) intimated that he intended to proceed with the Waitara Purchase, Richmond warned that hostilities were likely to be far-reaching. When fighting commenced, Richmond was in the field as a volunteer and inspector of defences. His own farm was raided and the stock driven off. The house was preserved by the Maoris as a convenient rest place; but was accidentally burned after the war by carpenters engaged on reconstruction.

In 1860 Richmond was elected to the General Assembly as representative of Omata. The Taranaki Provincial Superintendent, Cutfield, resigned in 1861, and Richmond contested the seat and lost. In his election campaign he strongly urged the settlers to adopt a conciliatory tone in their peace demands, and to remember that those who now were enemies, were potential friends. A week later he was re-elected to the Provincial Council, though at the bottom of the poll. Having been correspondent of the Nelson Examiner for some time, Richmond decided later in this same year to move his young family to the less troubled atmosphere of Nelson. He became editor of the Examiner, occasionally practising his profession as consulting engineer to mining companies.

In March, 1862, Richmond was appointed to the post of Provincial Secretary; in which capacity he made several overland journeys on horseback down the West Coast and to Canterbury, adding all the time to his collection of landscape sketches. Voyages

down the West Coast by the ketch *Jane* to the mouth of the Grey River and an overland journey from Nelson to the mouth of the Buller produced some of Richmond's best work.

Until January, 1862, he remained a member of the Provincial Council for Grey and Bell, continuing as a member of Parliament for Omata. In August, 1864, he became member for Amuri in the Nelson Provincial Council, resigning from the Executive in 1865—it being considered that this post was incompatible with his tenure of the Commissionership of Crown Lands. When, in June, Weld offered him the post of Colonial Secretary, with a seat in the Legislative Council, he resigned from both the Provincial Council and the House. In 1865 he visited Central Otago and Dunedin, where he is known to have exhibited, and to have attended sessions of the art club founded by W. M. Hodgkins.

After his wife's death he moved to New Plymouth with his five young children to be near their relatives. In October, 1865, the Weld Government was defeated. Richmond joined the Stafford Government in 1866, being appointed Commissioner of Customs and Stamp Duties and informally, Minister of Native Affairs — Stafford explaining in the House that 'Native Affairs had so much improved that there appeared to be no longer any speciality in dealing with them'.

Richmond accepted these essentially civil portfolios, but very soon was riding hundreds of miles visiting restless tribes. In 1866 he became chairman of the Native Affairs Committee; and later, was openly addressed as Native Minister. The years of his office were the years of the last Maori War, that with Te Kooti on the East Coast. As Native Minister, Richmond acted throughout in close association with the Defence Minister, Haultain, spending many weeks in the field until the defeat of the Government in 1869 put an end to his active participation in the campaign.

Out of Parliament at last in 1872, Richmond left for England with his three eldest children. While they were at school he lived and painted in the Tyrol and Switzerland; and for three years was engaged with an English company on railway construction in Algeria, between Oran and Tlemsen. Another three years were spent in London; and in

1880 the family returned to New Zealand.

In Melbourne, John Gully joined the ship. Gully had been a draughtsman and surveyor in the Provincial Service under Richmond, and had left the Survey Department in 1878 to devote himself to painting. He and Richmond spent some time sketching together at Milford Sound, the first point at which they landed in New Zealand.

Richmond again settled in Nelson, buying a house and building a studio. He spent most of the rest of his life there; though there were two further visits to England during this period,\* as well as a trip to the headwaters of the Waimakariri, and

another with Gully to Lakes Manapouri and Te Anau. He made one more attempt to enter Parliament, contesting the Waimea seat in 1881. In 1883 he was called to the Legislative Council, leaving his studio each session to attend to his duties in Wellington until his final retirement in 1892.

James Richmond died in 1898 at Otaki.
