These works share some of the cartoon's qualities without quoting directly from their frames. Here we explore the graphic opportunities that this rich visual language has presented to artists.

8+9 Kiwi comic art

Near-forgotten artists and short-lived publishing efforts mark our comic history. Original artwork and comics by our cartoon pioneers as well as those working today feature here.

After wartime restrictions American titles like The Phantom and Superman and Marvel and DC comics made an eagerly awaited reappearance.


12 \ The origins of the British comic paper
