
Tū mai hei kaihōpara Matariki! Become a Matariki explorer!

KO WAI A MATARIKI? WHAT IS MATARIKI?

Ko Matariki te whakapotonga o te kõrero 'Ngā Mata o te Ariki Tāwhirimātea', ā, ko te ingoa tēnei o te kāhui whetū ka kitea i te whaturua. He tohu tēnei o te tau hou mō ngā iwi maha.

E ai ki te ao Māori, i tino riri a Tāwhirimātea, te atua o ngā hau, i te wehenga o ōna mātua, o Ranginui rāua ko Papatūānuku. I tīkarohia e ia ōna karu, ā, i whiua atu ki ngā rangi. I huri ēnei hei whetū. Hei tā ētahi iwi, ko Matariki te māmā, ko Tupuānuku rātou ko Tupuārangi, ko Waitī, ko Waitā, ko Waipunarangi, ko Uruangi ngā tamāhine i te kāhui whetū nei.

Ka rerekē ngā wā whakanui i a Matariki i tēnā iwi, i tēnā iwi: ko tā ētahi, hei te kitenga tuatahitanga o te kāhui i te ata hāpara, ko tā ētahi anō, hei muri atu i te marama hua, hei te tīmatanga o te marama hua hou e whai ake ana rānei. Ki ētahi iwi e whitu ngā whetū, ki ētahi atu iwi anō, e iwa kē.

He wā pai a Matariki mō ngā tāngata katoa o Aotearoa ki te noho tahi, ki te huritao mō te tau kua hipa, ki te whakanui hoki i te inamata me te whakamahere i te anamata.

Matariki is an abbreviation of 'Ngā Mata o te Ariki Tāwhirimātea' (the eyes of the god Tawhirimatea) and is the Māori name for the cluster of stars that rises in midwinter. It marks the start of the new year for many iwi.

According to te ao Māori (the Māori worldview), the god of the wind, Tāwhirimātea, was so angry when his brothers separated his parents, Ranginui the sky father and Papatūānuku the earth mother, that he tore out his eyes and threw them into the heavens. These became the stars. For some iwi the Matariki stars are a mother, Matariki, surrounded by her six daughters Tupuānuku, Tupuārangi, Waitī, Waitā, Waipunarangi and Uruangi.

lwi celebrate Matariki at different times: some when the cluster is first seen in the dawn sky, others after the full moon rises or at the beginning of the next full moon. For some iwi the star cluster contains seven stars. while for others it has nine.

Matariki is an opportunity for all people of Aotearoa New Zealand to come together and reflect on the year that has passed, celebrate the present and plan for the future.

NGOHE ACTIVITY



Each of the stars of Matariki has its own name and is associated with different elements and themes. The brightness of each star is seen as a sign for the coming year; the brighter the star, the more important that element will be.

The names and meanings of the stars differ between iwi; here we will look closely at those described by leading Māori astronomer, Dr Rangi Mātāmua.

WAITĪ

Kia ora!

Mātai whakarunga atu ki tā Reuben Paterson Guide Kaiārahi. kei waho i te tomokanga o te Whare Toi.

Ngohe: Ki ō whakaaro, e haere ana tēnei waka ki hea, mai i hea hoki? Ka kite koe i te aha, ka rongo koe i te aha i tō haere tahi me te waka? Tāngia mai, tuhia mai rānei ō whakaaro ki raro iho nei, ā, whakaputa i ō whakaaro ki tō whānau, ki tō hoa rānei.

Kia ora!

Gaze up at Reuben Paterson's Guide Kaiārahi outside the Gallery's entrance.

Activity: Where do you think this waka might be travelling to and from? What would you see, feel and hear if you were journeying with it? Draw or write your ideas below and share them with whānau or a friend.

E hono ana tēnei whetū ki ngā wai māori (ngā roto, ngā awa, ngā manga, ngā repo), ngā tupu, me ngā kararehe e noho ana ki reira.

Ngohe: Toro atu ki He Whakawhaiāipo i te Kohikohinga ka kitea ngā mahi toi o ngā wai māori (ngā manga, ngā awa, me ngā roto). E kite ana koe i tētahi mahi toi e hāngai ana ki te awa, engari ehara i te peita? Tāngia i te pouaka kei raro iho nei.

This star is connected with freshwater (lakes, rivers, streams, wetlands) and the plants and animals that live there.

Activity: Explore Romancing the Collection and find artworks where vou can see freshwater (streams. rivers and lakes). Can you find an artwork that is about a river, but isn't a painting? Draw it in the box below.



WAITĀ

E hono ana tēnei whetū ki te wai tai me ngā kai o roto.

Ngohe: He maha ngā peita kei He Whakawhaiāipo i te Kohikohinga e whakaatu ana i te moana. Tāngia tētahi huahua o te mahi toi pai ki a koe. Ko ngā aha ngā kararehe kei raro i te karetai o te wai? He aha ngā kakara ka rongo tō ihu, ngā tangi ka rongo ō taringa ka kite ana koe i te kararehe rā?

This star is associated with the ocean and the food that comes from it.

Activity: In Romancing the Collection there are many paintings depicting the ocean. Draw a sketch of your favourite artwork. What creatures do you think you would find if you looked under the water's surface? What smells and sounds do you imagine when you look at it?



TUPUĀRANGI

E hono ana tēnei whetū ki ngā kai o te rangi, arā ki ngā huarākau me ngā manu.

Ngohe: Toro atu ki He Whakawhaiāipo i te Kohikohinga. E hia ngā manu e kite nei koe? He aha te tangi o ēnei manu? This star is linked with all the food that comes from the sky, such as berries and birds.


Activity: Explore Romancing the Collection. How many birds can you find? What would they sound like?

E hono ana tēnei whetū ki te hunga kua mate.

Ngohe: He maha ngā kararehe i He Whakawhaiāipo i te Kohikohinga! Āta titiro atu – e hia ngā kararehe kāore i ngā peita? Mā hea mai ērā kararehe ki te wharetoi? Whakarārangihia mai, tāngia mai rānei ki raro iho nei.

This star is associated with those who have died and passed on.

Activity: There are lots of animals in *Romancing the Collection*! Look closely – how many can you find that aren't in the paintings? How do you think they came to be in the Gallery? List or draw them below.





WAIPUNARANGI

Ko 'ngā puna wai i te rangi' te tikanga o te ingoa, e hono ana tēnei whetū ki te ua.

Ngohe: Toro atu ki te whakaaturanga o Visible Evidence: Max Oettli, Photographs 1965– 1975, i te papa tuatahi. E kite ana koe i ētahi whakaahua e tahuri ai ō whakaaro ki te ua? E kite ana koe i te aha e tahuri ai ō whakaaro ki te ua? Tuhia mai, tāngia mai rānei tāu whakautu ki raro iho nei. Meaning 'water that pools in the sky', Waipunarangi is a star linked to the rain.

Activity: Explore the exhibition Visible Evidence: Max Oettli, Photographs 1965–1975 on Level 1. Can you find any photographs that make you think of rain? What can you see that makes you think it has been raining? Write or draw your answer below.



TUPUĀNUKU

E hono ana tēnei whetū ki ngā kai e tupu ana i te whenua.

Ngohe: Toro atu ki tā Yona Lee Arrangement for 5 Rooms i te papa tuatahi. E hia ngā tupu e tāwerewere ana e kite nei koe? Tāngia tāu e kite nei ki te pouaka i raro iho nei. This star is linked with all the food that grows in the soil.

Activity: Explore Yona Lee's

Arrangement for 5 Rooms on Level 1.

How many hanging plants can you find? Draw what you see in the box below.

URURANGI

E hono ana tēnei whetū ki ngā hau.

Ngohe: He mea rānei i tā Yona Lee Arrangement for 5 Rooms e tahuri ai ō whakaaro ki ngā hau? Tīwhiri: Ina tū koe ki mua i tēnei mea ka rongo koe i te hau angiangi. Tāngia tētehi pikitia o tāu i kite ai ki te pouaka i raro iho nei.

This star is associated with the wind.

Activity: Is there anything in Yona Lee's Arrangement for 5 Rooms that makes you think of wind? Clue: If you stand in front of it you can feel a gentle breeze. Draw a picture of what you find in the box below.

MATARIKI


Ko te ingoa tēnei o tētehi o ngā whetū i te kāhui, ko te ingoa hoki tēnei o te kāhui whetū katoa. E hono ana tēnei whetū ki te oranga o te tangata, o te huritao, o te tūmanako, o te hononga ki te taiao, o te noho tahi a te tangata. He wahine tēnei whetū, e manaaki ana i ērā atu whetū o te kāhui.

Ngohe: Puta atu ki te East Terrace i te tomokanga o te papa tuarua. Tū kōtui tahi ki ngā tāngata i tō rōpū, tahuri atu ki Rangipuke, ā, whakamōhio atu i te mea pai ki a koe i ngā mea e kite nei koe. He rākau, he putiputi, he whakapakoko rānei? Ko te tangata kei tō taha rānei? Tāngia tētahi pikitia o taua mea ki te pouaka i raro iho nei.

This is the name of one of the stars as well as being the collective name for the group. It is associated with wellbeing, reflection, hope, our relationship with the environment and the gathering of people. It is thought of as a female star that looks after the other stars in the cluster.


