

Introduction

Auckland Zoo opened its doors to the community for the first time in December 1922. Back then, the population of Tāmaki Makaurau was just 85,000 and 1.9 billion humans lived on planet Earth. A century later, our city has grown to over 1.6 million people and the global population is now nearing 8 billion. In the last one hundred years, Auckland and the world have changed beyond all recognition, and so has the role and purpose of a good, modern zoo.

During this time there has been a devastating decline in our planet's biodiversity with an estimated decrease in wildlife populations of more than two-thirds over the last 50 years. The world is experiencing its sixth mass extinction event and the reasons for the catastrophic loss of wildlife and wild places are entirely human in origin.

In New Zealand, currently 86% of the population lives in urban areas. By 2050, this is projected to increase to 92%. With this shift to urban environments there is a growing disconnect between people and the natural world. This disconnection, together with the urgent and alarming environmental issues, and the lasting effects of a global pandemic, can leave many feeling hopeless and disempowered.

As a good, modern zoo, dedicated to building a future for wildlife, we provide an accessible gateway to reconnect people with nature, to enhance wellbeing, foster empathy, build optimism and mobilise social change for people to become powerful advocates for healthy communities and healthy ecosystems.

Our wildlife conservation science work means we take an evidence-based approach that uses data, and our skills, experience, and passion to make a difference. This includes the way in which we care for animals at the Zoo. Increasingly however, this intensive wildlife management expertise is also being deployed to support and conserve species in the wild. We work with the Department of Conservation, community groups and other conservation partners to help wildlife recovery efforts across New Zealand and overseas.

We are a proud part of Auckland Unlimited within the wider Auckland Council whānau. The ongoing trust and support of our parent organisation has allowed us to not only grow our impact as a not-for-profit wildlife conservation zoo but, through Auckland Council's Long-term Plan, has also enabled the ambitious and exciting ongoing renewal of our zoo site for the next century of our journey.

Our Strategic Roadmap 2022–2027

At no time in our 100-year history has the role, relevance, and purpose of Auckland Zoo for people and for wildlife been more important than it is right now.

For the last decade, Auckland Zoo's mission statement has been to, 'Bring people together to build a future for wildlife'. This Strategic Roadmap setsout our commitments and our goals over the next five years, that will enable us to deliver on this mission and to move towards our vision of, 'A future where people value wildlife and species are safe from extinction'.

The 'Seven Commitments' of this Roadmap reflect our renewed strategic priorities as a community-focused cultural organisation in Tāmaki Makaurau Auckland, and as a modern wildlife conservation science organisation in Aotearoa New Zealand.

In turn, each of these goals has a series of initiatives and projects with outcomes, targets and measures that will enable the delivery of our commitments to people and to wildlife, to be tracked over the life of this five-year plan.

- 2 Auckland Zoo is a trusted and leading authority on native wildlife rescue and rehabilitation for key species.
- 3 All animals in Auckland Zoo's Species Plan contribute in a demonstrable way, through their identified roles to the delivery of the Zoo's mission.
- 4 All animals at Auckland Zoo have a Species Action Plan that provides a clear path to progressive care, an overall positive welfare state and sustainability.
- 5 Auckland Zoo is trusted and leading authority in the care, management and conservation of key plant species.



We will connect with as many people as possible, from as diverse a range of cultural and socio-economic backgrounds as we can. As a zoo, we will embrace diversity, equity, accessibility and inclusivity in our communities and the people of our organisation. We will engage in programmes and activities that help to foster a deeper connection with Tāmaki Makaurau Auckland, and that contribute to enhancing social, physical, mental and spiritual well-being.

Our Goals

- 1 Auckland Zoo is acknowledged as a key provider of activities and experiences that contribute to enhancing the aspects of 'Te Whare Tapa Whā' – the five ways of wellbeing – in our communities.
- 2 Accessibility to, and within the Zoo is improved for underrepresented communities within Auckland that wish to visit us.
- 3 Auckland Zoo's volunteers have a high level of engagement, and the programme is recognised as a leader of its type.
- 4 Auckland Zoo staff have a high level of engagement, and are offered opportunities for career development and progression within the organisation.
- 5 Auckland Zoo is acknowledged as meeting the needs of our diverse communities in what we offer in our activities and programmes.

We will offer our visitors and our wider audiences exceptional, inspiring and transformational experiences with Auckland Zoo. We will be absolutely compelling and consistent in our storytelling and in our calls to action for wildlife and the environment. We will motivate, mobilise and support our communities to become powerful wildlife conservation advocates and to develop a lifelong connection with nature.

- Auckland Zoo is acknowledged as providing high quality, valued experiences to, and with our communities.
- 2 Auckland Zoo is recognised and respected for its role and its importance as a leading wildlife conservation organisation.
- 3 Auckland Zoo is a trusted and influential voice within our communities on key conservation issues.
- 4 An experience with Auckland Zoo helps people to connect with nature and wildlife and understand their role in conservation.

- 5 Engaging with Auckland Zoo mobilises people to take action for wildlife and to protect the environment.
- 6 Auckland Zoo engages and connects with a large and diverse audience with creative and impactful onsite, outreach and online experiences.



We will grow the resources we commit to our field programme. We will ensure that these resources, and our skills that we dedicate to conserving wildlife in the wild, are allocated strategically and effectively to achieve measurable conservation outcomes.

Our Goals

- Auckland Zoo delivers a measurable contribution to wildlife conservation outcomes in Aotearoa New Zealand.
- 2 Auckland Zoo delivers a measurable contribution to wildlife conservation outcomes with priority projects in the South Pacific islands.
- 3 Auckland Zoo delivers a measurable contribution to wildlife conservation outcomes with priority projects internationally, beyond the Pacific region.
- 4 Auckland Zoo's suite of specialist intensive wildlife management skills are deployed in partnership with the Department of

- Conservation and other key partners in the conservation of threatened New Zealand wildlife.
- 5 Auckland Zoo's specialist conservation breeding facilities are managed to support the delivery of priority recovery programmes for New Zealand species.
- 6 Auckland Zoo's veterinary skills and resources are used to support the conservation medicine components of recovery programmes for priority New Zealand species.

We will take a science and research based approach in our activities that uses the best available data, our skills, our experience and our unique potential as a good modern zoo. We will be an incubator for future conservationists and a vocational training hub for current wildlife professionals. We will help build conservation science understanding and skills for people who want to build a career in conservation and for those who just want to do their bit for the environment.

Our Goals

- Auckland Zoo's relationships with education organisations at all levels, facilitate learning, training and research opportunities for current and future conservation professionals.
- 2 The science capability and scientific output of Auckland Zoo staff reflects the role and importance of the zoo as a wildlife conservation science organisation.
- 3 Auckland Zoo's internship, residency and apprenticeship programmes provide diverse audiences with a step on the ladder to a career in zoos and conservation.
- 4 Auckland Zoo's community and citizen science programmes provide opportunities for people to engage in learning and training initiatives that support wildlife conservation.

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We will recognise Te Reo Māori and Te Ao Māori in our Zoo's past and incorporate it into our present and future. We will develop our Zoo as an Asia-Pacific organisation in modern Aotearoa New Zealand that is distinctively of this land. We will develop increasingly meaningful and productive relationships with tangata whenua and the mana whenua of Tāmaki Makaurau Auckland.

Our Goals

- 1 Te Puna Waiora, our Auckland Zoo Te Reo Māori Capability Plan – is embedded throughout the organisation at a strategic and an operational level.
- 2 The capability of Auckland Zoo's people in Te Reo and Te Ao Māori reflects the bicultural journey of the organisation.
- 3 Auckland Zoo is recognised by the mana whenua of Tāmaki Makaurau Auckland as a valued and trusted partner in community and conservation initiatives.
- 4 Mātauranga Māori programmes are considered by schools and our communities as an essential component of our engagement portfolio.

We will optimise the opportunities to enrich life in Tāmaki Makaurau Auckland by working as part of Auckland Unlimited and in partnership with other organisations to increase our efficiency, reach and impact.

As a not-for-profit organisation, subsidised by the people of Auckland, we will ensure that we use our money wisely and responsibly to deliver on our commitments. None of our financial activities will conflict with our mission or our values. We will continue to operate, maintain and renew our infrastructure in a way that seeks to minimise our environmental impact.

- Auckland Zoo is recognised across Auckland as a leading sustainable organisation by minimising the environmental impact of our operation.
- 2 As part of Auckland Unlimited, Auckland Zoo operates an ethical and sustainable business model that contributes to the economic vitality of Tāmaki Makaurau Auckland.
- 3 Auckland Zoo's Covid-19 response, and the recovery plan, attenuates the impact

- of the pandemic on the Zoo's operations and programmes.
- 4 The ongoing delivery of Auckland Zoo's physical masterplan results in the renewal of the zoo site and the efficient and effective use of allocated capital resources.
- 5 Auckland Zoo's assets and infrastructure are managed and maintained in a prioritised and efficient way for future generations of Aucklanders.
